



## BENEVOLENT CASES

During the period 1 January 1990 to 30 November 1990 the sum of £15075.00 has been spent on assisting 97 members of the Regiment and their families. Out of that total the Army Benevolent Fund contributed £4142.00. The amount spent this year is an increase of £5000 on the 1989 figure.

Financial need is almost always the root cause of personal problems which come to our attention. In the majority of cases illness and age play a large part.

90% of the cases that are brought to my notice by SSAFA are from former members of the regiment who do not belong to the Regimental Association. It is also most unusual for a letter of thanks to be sent to the regimental association after assistance has been given.

The types of case assisted during the year include: 4 Nebulizers for Asthma sufferers, three wheel chairs, rent, fuel and light arrears, special diets, clothing, transport to hospitals. Support for the two retarded children (now in their 40's) whose fathers were killed in World War 2 continues. They are both in care. We also have 11 widows/widowers in nursing homes requiring assistance with the shortfall in the nursing home fees.

#### FIELD OF REMEMBRANCE

The Secretary attended the Field of Remembrance on Thursday 8 November and prior to the commencement of the opening ceremony planted individually named crosses on the regimental plot for each of the 46 battalions who fought in World War 1. Maj Gen Sir John Willoughby very kindly painted each cross with the Bn title.

A badged regimental cross was also planted on the Far East Prisoners of war plot in memory of members of the 1st Bn.

At noon H.M. Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother, declared the Field of Remembrance open and planted the first cross. The Queen Mother then proceeded to inspect the Field of Remembrance.

The Regimental Ceremony took place on Saturday 10 November, commencing at 10.50 a.m. As usual our party formed up outside the Middlesex Guildhall and then proceeded to the regimental plot led by Mr L. Plumb with Mr L. Loomes carrying the Regimental Standard. Sadly no Chelsea Pensioners this year to escort the Standard. We now only have one and he was too ill to attend.

The Service commenced with prayers by the Rev W.E.B. (Gus) Jones. The President of The Regimental Association, Lt-Col T.W. Chattey read the Exhortation, which was followed by the Two Minutes silence. Lt-Col Chattey after saying, 'I plant this cross today in memory of our Fallen Comrades', planted a cross. The Secretary then invited the planting of individual crosses. The Chaplain concluded the service by reading the Collects of the Middlesex and Queen's Regiment.

The attendance this year was a great improvement and very encouraging for the future. All members took opportunity to inspect the regimental display in the entrance hall to the Guildhall.

# JAPANESE BURMA VETERANS ASSOCIATION

Colonel John Shipster recently visited Japan at the invitation of the Japanese Burma Veterans Association. The visit was a success for both parties. They visited and paid their respects at the Yasuk Shrine in Tokyo – the Shrine commemorates all those who died during the war. At the end of the visit they were to the Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery at Hodogaya which is in the suburbs of Yokohama, accompanied by their hosts. This cemetery is in a most beautiful setting enclosed by small tree clad hillocks which were in full autumn colours. The party had brought a wreath with them and this was laid at the Central Cenotaph by Maj Gen D.H. Lyall-Grant, CBE, who was the senior member of the party. A short and simple Service of Remembrance was held attended by the Naval Military Attache of the British Embassy. Brig David Wilson, A&SH, who had borrowed some bag pipes from goodness knows where, piped a most moving lament. At the conclusion of the Service the party recited the well known inscription which appears on the Memorial at the Kohima Cemetery, India.

When you go home, tell them of us and say, For your tomorrow we gave our today.

Time was short and it was not possible to visit every Middlesex grave in the Hodogaya Cemetery. John found the graves of 51 Diehards.

58 Diehards lie in this cemetery which contains 1518 Commonwealth graves. These Diehards died in Kobe Camp between 1942-45, after surviving the sinking of the Lisbon Maru, destined never to recover from their traumatic ordeal. I mention a few names – Lt-Col H.W.M. Stewart (Posthumously awarded the DSO), Sgts Betts, Fox, Privates Bindon, Cohen, Funnell, Harrison, Sheehan, Bds Nix, Wilson, etc.

A separate part of the cemetery contains the graves of some members of the 1st Bn killed in Korea.

## **OBITUARY**

It is with deep regret that we have to announce the following have died:-

ABELL - On 13 August 1990, Squadron Leader James Martin Abell, aged 80 years. Jim Abell's father was Major W.H. Abell, killed at Mons on 23 August 1914, whilst serving with our 4th

BLACKBURN - On 12 September 1990, Major Frederick Henry (Blackie) Blackburn (243710), aged 87

Blackie joined the RAMC as a Private soldier on 28 Ocrober 1919, at the age of 16 years.e On 21 January 1921 he transferred to the RAOC and in early 1922 transferred to the Middlesex Regiment. He joined the 1st Bn serving on the Rhine, Singapore, India and Sudan and U.K. until 1933 when he was transferred to the Reserve. He was recalled in 1939 serving at the Depot and on 9 September 1942 was granted a commission in the Royal Pioneer Corps with whom he served until 1946. One of his interesting stories is that he was responsible for starting the British War Memorial Cemetery at El Alamein in 1943. For many years he lived at Mill Hill and in 1987 moved to Sittingbourne, Kent, after the death of his wife. He was a regular correspondent. Capt P.J.A. Pielou attended the funeral - Blackie attended the trip to Hong Kong in 1989.

BRAND - On 23 November 1990, Sgt Charles Arthur Brand, aged 76 years. Charlie Brand served with 7 Platoon, B Company, 2/8th (1st Bn) and went through the Normandy campaign. He was wounded on Hill 112 but returned to duty within six weeks. He left the 1st Bn at Lubecke on posting to the 2nd Bn in Egypt in June 1945 and on to Palestine in the December and demobilisation in early 1946.

- BUTLER On 8 December 1989, Lt Sidney Arthur Victor Butler, aged 92 years.

  Sidney Butler served in World War 1 with the King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry. During World War 2 he served in the Middlesex Home Guard. He became a Honorary Member of the Mill Hill Branch and the Regimental Association in the early 50's and attended many branch meetings as he lived at Hendon. In his will Sidney bequeathed £1,000 to the Regimental Charitable Fund.
- CORNER On 20 November 1990, Mrs L. Corner, widow of WO2 Viv Corner (6200915), who died on 7 February 1988.
- DANIELS On a date in June 1990, Private T.W. Daniels (89108), aged 90 years. He served with the 1st throughout World War 1 1914-19.
- DE GAYE On 8 July 1990, Major John De Gaye, aged 66 years.

  John was commissioned into the Regiment on 12 December 1942. I have no details of his war time service until he joined the 1st Br in 1946 serving with the Bn in Rendsburg and Iserlohn. In 1948 he was appointed GSO3 Int GHQ MELF and in 1949 joined the Western Union Defence Organisation BAQR. In 1953 he served with the Royal Fusiliers in Korea and was wounded. His next posting was to SHA where he remained until his retirement on 30 April 1961.
- FAYERS On 28 October 1990, Private Stanley Robert Fayers (6214340), aged 75 years.

  He served with C Company, 1/7th Bn 1940-46 and only joined the Regimental Association in August.

  Sadly he had been confined to a wheel chair for many years. He recently had a holiday at the Queen Alexandra Hospital Home at Gifford House, Worthing, and was a member of a group which attended a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace.
- FORDHAM On 9 November 1990, Private Alec Fordham, aged 95 years.

  He joined the regiment at Mill Hill in 1914, trained with the 5th Bn at Chatham and was then posted to the 2/10th Bn in Egypt and the Palestine campaign. After the disbandment of the 2/10th Bn he served for another year with the Isle of Wight Rifles in the Sudan. He became blind during the last few years of his life. His son Reg tells me that he and his brother used to read parts of the newsletter to him and this gave him much enjoyment.
- HARPUR On 1 August 1990, Major Brian Harpur, MC, aged 72 years.

  Brian Harpur joined the Middlesex Regiment as a Private soldier in 1939 and was commissioned into the regiment in 1940 and was posted to the 1st Bn Princess Louise's Kensington Regiment. He saw service in Tunis, Sicily and Italy 1943-45, was Mentioned in Dispatches at Cassino and was awarded the Military Cross in the River Senio battle April 1945. He was Director of Associated Newspapers 1964-83, Responsible for Daily Mail Translantic Air Race 1969, Founder of Halley's Comet Society and author of "The Impossible Victory".
- HELLIADIS On 21 August 1989, Private Nicholas Henry Helliadis (6202746), aged 72 years.

  He enlisted during December 1935 and joined the 1st Bn in Singapore March 1936, serving with C and
  D Companies. He moved with the 1st Bn to Hong Kong in August 1937 and was taken P.O.W. on 25
  December 1941. He survived the sinking of the Lisbon Maru on 1 October 1942, and served his POW
  days in Osaka Camp, Japan. He returned to UK in November 1945 and was discharged in May 19
- HOBSON On 28 June 1990, WO1 Albert Joseph Hobson (202820), aged 76 years. Bert Hobson enlisted on 1 February 1933 and on completion of his recruit training was posted to the 2nd Bn at Colchester. In March 1936 he joined the 1st Bn in Singapore and moved with the Bn to Hong Kong in August 1937. On 25 December 1941 he was taken POW with the remainder of the Bn. He survived the sinking of the Lisbon Maru on 1 October 1942, and served his POW days in Kobe Camp, Japan. He was repatriated to UK in October 1945. He kept diaries during his days as a guest of the Nips, seven survived which I (Secretary) now hold, sadly the remainder were lost during searches and had to be dumped in 'the buckets'. He was repatriated to UK in October 1945, and having served 12 years reengaged to complete 22 years for pension. He was discharged on 31 January 1955. The very next day he re-enlisted into the RASC and eventually became a WO1 Chief Clerk. His last posting was to SEATO HO, Thailand. In 1963 he saw a job opportunity in Bangkok and took his discharge. He and his wife remained in Bangkok until April 1990 when Bert became very ill and it was necessary for him and his wife Ethel to return to UK. On arrival in UK they were accommodated at Mais House, Bexhill on Sea. Sadly Bert died on 28 June. He was an excellent sportsman who excelled at Running, Cross Country and Boxing, At one time he was Groom to our President.

The funeral took place at Bexhill on Sea, the Regimental Flag draped the coffin and as Secretary I attended the funeral with my write to respect a great friend and a comrade who I will sadly miss. The Royal British Legion staff who control Mais House were most helpful and assisted in every way possible providing a buffet tea and drinks for the mourners – the majority knew Bert and Ethel in Bangkok and had travelled long distances to attend the funeral. I would like to place on record the sterling work he did as a POW and was an inspiration to his fellow POW's. He had the gift of 'acquiring' a few luxuries from the docks, such as sugar, sardines etc, and getting them past the guards to share with the sick who were unable to work. The late Maj Gen Chris Man, Martin Weedon and Ewan would confirm my statement were they alive today. To Mrs Ethel Hobson our sincere condolences.

- HODGSON On 23 July 1990, Private George Gray Hodgson (6207383), aged 69 years. George Hodgson commenced his service with the 7th Bn on 3 May 1939, joining B Company 2/7th Bn in September 1939. During 1941 he was transferred to the Royal Engineers – his trade being Millwright.
- HONESS On 4 October 1990, Major S.E. Honess (Kim) (255799), aged 70 years.

  Kim Honess joined the Princess Louise's Kensington Regiment as a Private soldier in early 1942. On 12
  December 1942 he was commissioned into the Middlesex Regiment and posted to the Royal Norfolk
  Regiment and then to the 1st Bn The Royal Hampshire Regiment. He was with this Bn in Normandy and

Poecember 1942 he was commissioned into the Middlesex Regiment and posted to the Royal Normank Regiment and then to the 1st Bn The Royal Hampshire Regiment. He was with this Bn in Normandy and was wounded and evacuated to the UK. He attended Staff College in 1947 and this was followed by a 18 month course at the London University learning Japanese. He joined the 1st Bn in Austria 1953 and was Adjutant of the Bn when new Colours were presented. In March 1956 he became DAAG HQ. SW District. Taunton, retiring on 4 June 1959.

- HUGHES On 29 September 1990, Private Angus (Jock) Hughes (2978223), aged 76 years. He enlisted at Mill Hill on 11 January 1935 (as McEachran) and joined the 1st Bn in Singapore in March 1936. He moved with the Bn to Hong Kong during August 1937 and was taken POW 25 December 1941 and remained in Shamshuipo Camp until 1943 when he was moved to Tokyo, Japan, and held in No. 1 Camp. He was repatriated to UK in October 1945 and transferred to the Army Reserve in May 1946. During his service he was a good sportsman especially at soccer. Sadly for many years he suffered serious illness and paid. Mr Tom Barnett kindly attended the funeral and the Regimental Flag draped the coffin.
- JACOB On 26 July 1990, Mrs Aubrey Beatrice de Vere Jacob, aged 85 years, widow of Major M.A. Jacob who died 17 May 1972, aged 68 years.
- JOHNS On 13 October 1990, Private Douglas John Johns, aged 72 years. He served with the 1/7th Bn 1939-45 and was a great friend of the late Mr Taffy Evans of Albuhera Close, Enfield.
- LAWRENCE On 26 September 1990, Private Kenneth Lawrence, aged 59 years.

  Ken Lawrence died very suddenly at work. He served with the 1st Bn in Korea 1950-51. He was a very smart soldier and carried the Standard for the Kent Branch of the Korean Veterans Association on many occasions. The funeral was attended by Major A.E.F. Waldron, Mr R. Fitch and Mr D. Galvin from the regiment. The Regimental Flag draped the coffin and various Standards from BKVA branches were in attendance. A bugler from the Royal Scots Fusiliers stationed at Canterbury sounded Last Post and Reveille.
- MAN On 29 September 1990, Mrs Georgina (Topsy) Man, loving wife of the late Maj Gen C.M.M. Man. The funeral took place at Blair Atholl on 4 October 1990 and the Regiment were represented by Mrs Kay Lawrence.
- MAKEWELL On 22 August 1990, WO2 William Robert Makewell, DCM (6189463), aged 89 years. 
  'Sonny' Makewell enlisted on the 8 February 1919 and on completion of his recruit training joined the 2nd Bn overseas. Service in Germany, Singapore, India and Sudan followed until the Bn reverted to home establishment in December 1931. Service with the Bn at Colchester, Portsmouth and Gosport followed. In 1939 he was posted as PSI to the 1/7th Bn and went to France with the Bn. It was on 28 May 1940, just prior to the Dunkirk evacuation, that Sonny was recommended by the late Lt-Col B.B. Rackham for the award of the Distinguished Conduct Medal, for conspicuous gallantry and leadership in the face of the enemy. The award was promulgated on 23 October 1940. He was later medically downgraded and spent the remainder of the war as A/RSM at the Weapon Training School, Purfleet, Hants. In 1946 he was posted to the 7th Bn stationed at Tottenham Drill Hall until his discharge in 1951. He immediately enlisted on a T.A. engagement of 4 years finally putting his feet up in 1955. In 1926 he married Rose, daughter of Private Byran, the Bn QM Storeman a regimental marriage that lasted for 64.

years.

The funeral took place on 30 August, the Regimental Flag draped the coffin. Members of the Dunkirk and the Royal British Legion attended the funeral with their Standards.

- PEARTON On 20 November 1989, Private Frederick J. Pearton (10439), aged 92 years.
  Fred enlisted during May 1915 at Pound Lane and in June 1915 was posted to the 18th Brithen at
  Givinchy. He was wounded on the Somme on 22 June 1916 near Anmequin Nortti. He returned to
  France in November 1916 and joined the 2nd Britian at Bethune and was with the British until wounded in the
  neck and taken POW on 26 March 1918.
- RANDALL On 21 June 1990, C/Sgt Alfred Francis Randall (2609284), aged 84 years.

  Alf Randall commenced his service with the Grenadier Guards in 1932. At the outbreak of war in 1939 he joined the 1/8th Bn and became CQMS to A Company. He was at Dunkirk with the Bn and served throughout the war with the 1/8th Bn, finally being demobbed in September 1945.
- TAYLOR On 19 November 1990, Capt Ronald George Taylor, aged 74 years.

  Ron Taylor enlisted during 1934 and on completion of his recruit training at Mill Hill joined the 2nd B Colchester. In 1935 he became a member of the 'Save Egypt' draft and joined the 1st Bn at Moascar. The returned to UK and the 2nd Bn in early 1936. His promotion was rapid becoming a Cpl and then Sgt on the Education staff. He went to France with the 2nd Bn in September 1939 and was stationed at Gondecourt. On 31 May 1940 evacuation from Dunkirk commenced. The Bn eventually concentrated at Bridestowe Camp, Devon, for coastal defence protection. Posting to the 1/7th Bn followed and he saw service in Sicily and Italy returning to UK in November 1943. Back to France with 21st Army Group just after D Day. On 10 October 1946 he was commissioned as Lt and shortly afterwards left the army. He then applied and was granted a short service commission and the following appointments followed—Garrison Adjutant West African Forces, Freetown, and then Gambia, followed by the same appointment at Lipstaadt and Munster, BAOR. He retired in 1951. He later was employed by Brown Brothers Ltd and Plssey Company Ltd.
- WARREN On 5 August 1990, Major Charles H. Warren, aged 93 years.

  Major Warren served with the Middlesex Army Cadet Force for over 20 years.
- WELLER On 12 October 1990, Mrs Pamela Violet Weller, the widow of Major A.v. Weller who died in 1967.
- WHITE On 4 August 1990, Cpl Charles Frederick Kitchener White (6199494), aged 75 years.

  Cpl White enlisted as a boy soldier on 4 September 1930 and joined the Band of the 1st Bn stationed at
  Colchester. He joined the Band of the 2nd Bn at the end of 1931 when that Bn reverted to Home
  Establishment and remained with them until he was medically discharged on 11 May 1946. He leaves a
  widow, Dorothy, who was the daughter of the late Major (QM) W.H. (Bill) Pilley.
- WILLIAMS On 20 May 1990, 2Lt Trevor Williams (G/40135), aged 94 years.
  On 23 March 1916 he enlisted into the 26th (Bankers) Bn Royal Fusiliers. On 16 August 1916 he was a member of a draft of 150 who entrained for France. On arrival he was posted to our 12th Bn and took part in the battles of Thiepval, Albert, Arras and Passchendale. He was awarded the F.R.P.S. (Fellow Royal Photographic Society) on 26 November 1985.

## 51st (Highland) Division Pilgrimage to France 6 - 13 June 1990

At a Luncheon held in EDINBURGH in July 1987 Lt Gen Sir Derek Lang KCB DSO MC DL Chairman of the Divisional Dinner Club, proposed the idea of mounting a Pilgrimage to St. VALERY-en-Caux to take place in June 1990 to mark 50 years on from the historic stand made by Major General Victor Fortune's 1939/40 Division, which fought so valiantly there to hold up Rommel's encircling armour, until being finally forced to surrender on 12 June 1940, having afforded the BEF additional escape time at DUNKIRK.

Some 8000 of that first Division were captured around St. VALERY, many of whom were marched to POLAND, and then marched back into GERMANY when RUSSIA attacked from the West later in the War. One of these prisoners was Gordon Holmes who had joined 1 GORDONS atfourteen ah alf years and was only fifteen years old when captured in one of the GORDONS Infantry Platoons in 1940. He became re-united with his Platoon Commander at the time, now Major Ogilvie (ret'd), during the recent Pilgrimage.

The plans formed by Gen. Lang who, after escape in 1940, was later to command 5 CAMERONS in the victorious action and return on 2 September 1944 by the "second" Division, in which 1/7th MIDDLESEX had various functions were the Mayor of St. VALERY and his wife the deputy Mayoress, Area Prefects of FRANCE, Governmental Heads of Department, together with the Lord Provosts of ABERDEEN and PERTH, the PROVOSTS of INVERNESS and DUNDEE, and "veterans" from most of the Regiments and attached Formations and Corps of both the 1940 and 1944 Divisions. INVERNESS now is "twinned" with St. VALERY-en-Calix

Sadly, through illness, Brigadier James Oliver CB CBE DSO TD DL the Division's President was unable to attend – sadly he died on 4 October.

Bearing in mind that some 150 plus Members and Guests formed the final total country-wide, it was decided to enlist the support of ROGAN'S BATTLEFIELD TOURS of NUNEATON, who, with Lt Col. Alastair Rose our Divisional Secretary, co-ordinated the entire movement operations from EDINBURGH and GLASGOW via LONDON in three coaches to PORTSMOUTH, thence to LE HAVRE overnight on 6/7 June, and return overnight CHERBOURG/PORTSMOUTH overnight on 12/13 June. Thanks to their excellent joint efforts we all arrived and returned safely, and our thanks to the three individual coach drivers and Couriers should also be recorded. In coach 'C' our driver was Roy Wednagh (from HULL) and our Courier Nevin Anthony (from DYFED), the latter having served with South Wales Borderers in KOREA and is no stranger to our 1 MIDDLESEX who had served there also.

From the very outset Gen Lang was insistent that full details of the project should be circulated to all Units involved with both the first (1939/40), and the second re-formed 1941/45 Divisions, and a wonderful feeling of Divisional belonging pervaded throughout, many members of the collective formations being able to meet up with one another for the first time in over 50 years. It is now hoped to maintain and build on this spirit even more in future Divisional gatherings.

It is interesting to note that the 1939/40 Division was supported by two Machine Gun Bns – The 7th (then) NORTHUMBERLAND FUSILIERS and 1 KENSINGTONS of our sister TA Regiment. Also included in Division then was the (then) 7th NORFOLKS, a Pioneer Bn in those days. A story of the latter Bn came to light where a Platoon Commander, who later came back in June 1944 as Major H J Walker later to win a DSO in the CAEN Bridgehead, with the NORFOLK Bn in 59 Division, escaped from St VALERY with 18 of his men by taking over a deserted French fishing boat which they found oarless and promptly rowed out to a British Destroyer using their shovels GSI

1/7th MIDDLESEX was represented on the Pilgrimage by the writer who, very fortunately, was joined on Sunday 11 June by Stanley Lewis (of our former QM the late Charles Trestain's Dept) and his wife Pat. They had come straight on from DUNKIRK and the DUNKIRK Veterans' Celebrations there, which were also attended by a number of our 1/7 Mx Bn members who had served in 1940 when the Bn supported Gen Montgomery's 3 Division in the BEF.

## Details of the Itinerary undertaken are as follows:-

Day 2. Thursday 7 June.

Disembarked LE HAVRE 0715 hrs. Drive through NEUFCHATEL and AMIENS to SOMME Battlefield 1914/18. Visits to LA BOISSELLE, THIEPVAL, and BEAUMONT HAMEL, and walk round NEWFOUNDLAND

PARK the Canadian Area. Pipers accompanied a moving "drum head" Service, conducted by Revd. Angus Smith RA Ch. Dept, followed by Wreath laying at the striking setting of the 1914/18 "Highlander" Memorial there, unveiled by Marshal FOCH on 28 Sept 1924. Also a view of the immense "LOCHNAGAR CRATER" near the Memorial, where the Germans undermined a vast expanse of the British front line causing a casualty figure of 8000 front line personnel. So great was the carnage at this point that, when Remembrance Services are held there, Flanders poppies are dropped into the "crater" to observe a poignant memory to so many Fallen. The zig-zag outlines of the front line trenches have also been left as grim reminders of the closeness of the 1914/18 fighting.

- 1430 hrs. Vin d'honneur in Village of WAILLY BAILLON with the local Community. Guard of Honour formed by French Veterans.
- 1700 hrs. Visit to British/Canadian 1914/18 Cemetery at WARLOY for Service there.
- 1900 hrs. Late arrival after drive to DIEPPE for dinner and overnight stay in Hotel l'UNIVERS and two adjoining Hotels on sea front close to the Canadian 1942 Memorial.

## Day 3. Friday 8 June

- 0915 hrs.Drove to ABBEVILLE Area to RV with M. Andre de Wailly the celebrated French author who has made a particular study of the 1939/40 fighting around St. VALERY, and has published several books already on this subject. En route, we were fortunate to hear the reminiscences of two members of our Party, Capt D H Macalister Hall and Mr Mackie, who had actually fought there with 7 A & S H in June 1940. This pattern was to be followed during the next 4 days as individual members in the respective coaches were able to offer first hand comments on their experiences in June 1940, and then on the return with the second Division in June/July 1944 when we reached the NORMANDY Bridgehead Area. Against overwhelming odds in German armour and fire power 7 A ( S H lost over 500 in killed and wounded in June 1940 in this Area - a devastating experience.
- 1315 hrs.We reached the British Cemetery at MAREUIL CAMBERT for a Wreath Laying Ceremony, and here we found a number of graves of 4 CAMERONS (of which Gen. LANG was the Adjutant then in 1940), and of 4 SEAFORTHS, Lt Col Alastair Rose played the Pipes as a lone Piper at this Cemetery.
- 1330 hrs.On the outskirts of ABBEVILLE our whole Party joined up at the Chateau Bagatelle, the home of M. and Mme. de Wailly, where we were entertained to a Barbeque in their garden - a delightful setting in beautiful weather and extremely relaxing after having travelled so far and seen so much in the short time since our arrival.
- 1720 hrs.On the way back to DIEPPE we made a brief stop at GRANDCOURT Cemetery where Gordon Holmes found the grave of his friend "Georgie Porgy" CATO killed alongside him on 11 June 1940, amost 50 years on from that fateful date. He had travelled from COTTINGHAM N Humberside to pay this tribute to his long lost friend.
- 1830 hrs.Back to DIEPPE to Hotels. 51(H) Div Dinner Club members representing their respective Red Units were then driven by courtesy of KENT YEOMANRY (1940 Division members) in their coach to Hotel in St. VALERY to attend Dinner hosted by Gen. and Lady Lang to the Civic Dignitaries of St. VALERY on behalf of the whole Highland Divisional Party.

#### Day 4. Saturday 9 June

Morning free in DIEPPE

- 1315 hrs. Left Hotels in DIEPPE in our three coaches for drive to St. VALERY.
- 1400 hrs. Assembled at (Aberdeen Granite. 20 tons) Cliff Top 1940 Memorial to 51 (H) Div. unveiled on 10 June 1950 by "Tartan Tam" Maj Gen D N WIMBERLEY former GOC of second Division in honour of those fallen in 1939/45.
- 1430 hrs. Raising of Colours. Wreath laying. Presentation to present day Pipers of newly embroidered H D Pipe Banners, and three Pipers then played "Heroes of St. VALERY".
- 1500 hrs. Drove to Military Cemetery in St. VALERY. French Bands played Marsellaise, The Belgian, and our National Anthems. French Gendarmerie Band very good.

- 1515 hrs. Wreath laying Ceremonies and Speeches. French Gendarmerie and our Pipers played alternately.
- 1630 hrs. Drive to HOUDETOT for a very moving short Service conducted by Revd Smith over Graves of 1st Bn BLACK WATCH and members of the 5th demi-Brigade of CHASSEURS ALPINS who fought and fell together and were then buried by French villagers in their small Churchyard. One present day 51 Volunteer Bde Piper played very movingly at this short Service.
- 1930 hrs. Back to Hotels then off to Mayor's Celebration Dinner with Townspeople to our whole Party at Sports Hall in St. VALERY. Sadly had to leave early due to our coach drivers being 'on limit' on Tachometers. A great pity as we missed the "pudding" course said to have been excellent with Benedictine sauce accompaniment!

Day 5. Sunday 10 June

5 hrs. Left DIEPPE Hotels for St. VALERY.

1000 hrs. Assembled in Old Church in St. VALERY.

1030 hrs. Service headed by Bishop of Area (ROUEN) followed by Dedication of Highland Division Stained Glass Window (by the same designer who created the OUISTREHAM Church Window dedicated in June 1988). This one depicting the Port of St. VALERY as if seen from the air, embellished with bright red panes depicting the Town burning in 1940, and with barred lines surrounding to represent the closing German armour, and then entwined Roses for FRANCE and Thistles for SCOTLAND shining from lighter coloured panes to herald return, victory, and ultimate relief in 1944. This beautiful Window is the gift of the Scottish people of the Districts from whence came the Highland Regiments. The Pipe Major then played "The Mist Covered Mountains of Home". After Church the Parade formed up in the Place de la Guerre, awaited there by Pipes and Drums 153 Highland Arty Sp Regt RCT (V) with one Piper from each 51 HIGHLAND VOLUNTEER Bns.

Parade marched past the Mayor outside the Marie followed by the Presentation of the St. VALERY Medallion 1940/1990 by the children to the 1940 Veterans.

1200 hrs.Vin d'honneur at Sports Hall. At this Function the writer presented a MIDDLESEX REGIMENTAL SHIELD to mark the 1/7th Bn's participation in all the Division's Campaigns from EL ALAMEIN to BREMERHAVEN, and this will now hang proudly alongside the Highland Regiments' Shields in the Salle des Ecosses in St. VALERY.

1500 hrs. Military Music Festival at Stadium G. GAULARD including Pipes and Drums.

1630 hrs. Left for BAYEUX for fresh Hotels there prior to visiting NORMANDY Bridgehead. (A welcome drink and early night!)

Day 6. Monday 11 June

0915 hrs, Left BAYEUX Hotels to visit British Sector of MORMANDY Operations June/July 1944. Drove via CAEN to RANVILLE and British Left Flank, Visited RANVILLE Cemetery, 2562 Burials in RANVILLE of which 2151 are British. See detailed separate List, kindly prepared by Stanley Lewis during June 1988 OUISTREHAM visit showing names of 24 Members of MIDDLESEX, KÉNSINGTONS, and MIDDLESEX Commando Unit members at Rest in RANVILLE Cemetery. Personal tribute laid by the writer on behalf of 7 Pl. "B" Coy on grave of Sqt J H Harris K.I.A. ESCOVILLE 26.6.44. Searched for grave of Capt Norman Shippam our Bn Signals Officer who died of wounds received in the Bridgehead, but unable to find his grave in either RANVILLE or BAYEUX Cemeteries in the time available. Further Areas visited by the Party were PEGASUS BRIDGE, COURSEULLES and JUNO BEACH, ARROMANCHES and GOLD BEACH and various Museums.

11.30 hrs.Whilst in the NORMANDY Bridgehead we also visited Ste. HONORINE la Chardronnette, scene of fierce fighting until finally taken on 22 June, and where our Bn Machine Guns of 13 and 14 Platoons of "D", 12 Pl of "C" and 7 Pl of "B" Companies were all engaged under command of their respective Infantry Bns to add to the HD fire power there. Ste. HONORINE Church has since been re-built from the ruins we knew, and evoked many memories amongst our Party. Major John Lang MC and his Signaller/Wireless Operator "Arthur", formerly of 128 (Highland) Fd Regt RA, both in "C" coach vividly recalled their time in the Church tower. It was in Ste. HONORINE that Sgt Len Faiers, Int. Sgt of our "D" Coy found a copy of the German Order of Battle of this Sector, which was immediately passed back to our Intelligence at Div HO. He later received a congratulationary signal from Lt Col Andrew Man, our CO then. We also recollected the commotion created by 2 Tanks from the Polish Armd Bde which trundled up to the outer Village wall near the orchard to "stand by" until clattering away amidst more noise at "first light" the next morning.

Before leaving NORMANDY we also visited St. SAMSON CHURCH in OUISTREHAM where the earlier HD Window was dedicated on 4 June 1988. This window features the Badges of the 16 Regiments and Corps which formed the 'second' Division.

17.00 hrs. Return to BAYEUX Hotels for last overnight stay there.

## Day 7. Tuesday 12 June

- a.m. After breakfast luggage into coaches. Morning free in BAYEUX. Visited new Museum housing Bayeux Tapestry, and also visited Cathedral.
- 1400 hrs. Departed for AMERICAN SECTOR. Visited OMAHA BEACH, VIERVILLE, CARENTAN, URAH BEACH, and Ste. MERE EGLISE. An interesting topic at Ste. MERE EGLISE, perpetuated in realistic plastic showing the outline effigy of an American Paratrooper John Steele caught by his rigging on the Church Spire. He was shot in one foot, but feigned death. Later brought down still surviving. Some years later he re-visited the scene, and happened to meet the German Commandant of that Sector who recalled the incident, and was also re-visiting the area on the same day. Both said to have shaken hands.

Visited AMERICAN CEMETERY in CHERBOURG. 9384 graves from 1944 Assault Landings. Further tablet showing names of 1500 with no graves as bodies taken back to USA in so called "coffin ships" for later burial there according to next of kin wishes. Before leaving the Area most interesting to ee the remains existing out to sea of the famous MULBERRY HARBOUR.

2100 hrs. Embarked CHERBOURG for overnight ferry return to PORTSMOUTH. Dinner and Breakfast on board.

## Day 8. Wednesday 13 June

0630 hrs. Arrived PORTSMOUTH with the three coaches used throughout. Many old friendships had be renewed, and new ones made. Altogether a great and lasting experience.

## Acknowledgements

Most of the Hotels used were family owned and well run, and welcomed us most warmly. Mr Rogan the Principal of ROGAN'S BATTLEFIELD TOURS of NUNEATON travelled with the Party, and with his Couriers, one to each coach were most helpful. The Couriers soon fell in with us and asked for personal anecdotes during the daily coach journeys, and some H D stories will undoubtedly be woven into the fabric of their future commentaries!

"Never", said the W.O., "was I so pleased to see the MIDDLESEX again than I was then".
