



RECEPTION AT THE NATIONAL ARMY MUSEUM

Brig Tony Pielow, President of the Regimental Association and Lt-Col Tom Chattey, Chairman of the Regimental Museum Trust hosted a lunch on Friday 1 October at the National Army Museum. Guests included Col Sir Greville-Spratt, Honorary Colonel of the London Regiment, Mr Ian Robertson, Director of the National Army Museum, Deputy Honorary Colonels, (City of London Fusiliers Company, London Scottish Company), the Commanding Officer and Officers of the London Regiment, Members of the National Army Museum Staff together with some 40 members of the Regimental Association.

In his address Brig Tony Pielow talked about our close links with the London Regiment and mentioned how well B(The Queen's Regiment) Company were carrying forward many of the traditions and customs of the Middlesex Regiment. He also mentioned the liaison and continuing contact we have with the North West London Army Cadet Force. The competition for the Middlesex Regimental Cane, presented by Gen Chris Man, awarded annually to the best all-round cadet still takes place and the cadets are aware of and support the strong connections to the Middlesex Regiment.

Col Tom Chattey spoke about the decision that he and the Museum Trustees took to move the Middlesex Regimental Museum into the National Army Museum. He said that 23 Old Comrades, representing battalions of the Regiment and branches of the Association, had attended the inaugural reception held at the NAM on Albuhera Day last year. The main purpose then was to explain the role of the NAM and their intentions for the future of our museum memorabilia. The success of that reception had decided the Trustees to greatly increase the numbers attending this year and thus provide more Old Comrades with this special opportunity to view the regimental artefacts in their new and enhanced surroundings. He reiterated that obviously it was not possible to display the full range of regimental relics but he was pleased to see that already there were a considerable number of our items on display around the Museum.

He expressed the thanks and appreciation of everyone for the generous hospitality of the Directors and Staff of the NAM, and said that it was a clear demonstration of the close and very successful liaison which had grown between the two organisations. He drew everyone's attention to the regimental flag flying at the entrance to the NAM.

He was certain that the decision made to move was the right one in that the National Army Museum had the Staff, the knowledge and the facilities to maintain and preserve our memorabilia and artefacts for the future.

The Director, Mr Ian Robertson, said how pleased he was to welcome us all. His Staff are now cataloguing and repairing/maintaining, where necessary, the many items taken over from the Middlesex Collection and that during the course of the next few months many more items would appear on display. He said there would be a large Middlesex presence in the new Victorian Gallery now under construction and due to be opened later this year. He hoped that members of the Association would call in to the Museum to view the new gallery once it was open. He mentioned that he had a strong family connection with the Regiment in that members of his family had served in or were connected to the Middlesex Regiment for many years, and that the Victoria Cross of his uncle, Captain Maurice Toye (2nd Bn 1916) was now included in the display. Finally he said that entry to the museum was free and that all are welcome.

ANNUAL REMEMBRANCE SERVICE AT THE MIDDLESEX GUILDHALL

Forty seven members of the Regimental Association, their wives and friends attended the Annual Remembrance Service at the Middlesex Guildhall on Saturday the 13th of November 1993. The Service was conducted by the Rev Gus Jones, our Padre in Korea. Brigadier Tony Pielow, our President, read the Exhortation that was followed by two minutes silence. He then laid a wreath from all members of the Association inscribed "To the memory of those Diehards who made the supreme sacrifice 1755 to 1966". Lt Col John Hewson, our Chairman, read the lesson taken from The Wisdom of Solomon, Chapter 3 verses 1 - 9. The service ended by the congregation saying the collects of the Middlesex and the Princess of Wales's Regiment. A glass of sherry was enjoyed by all before leaving. It was very pleasing to see such a good turn out.

- a. ".... and it was observed that our dead, particularly the 57th Regiment, were lying, as they had fought, in ranks, and every wound was in the front.".
- b. "... nothing could exceed the conduct and gallantry of Colonel Inglis, at the head of his Regiment."

Clearly seen is the print of "Steady the Drums and Fifes" in the centre and the Middlesex Regimental Guidon on the right of the picture. The Guidons of our Forbear Regiments were initially introduced in the 1st Battalions of The Queen's Regiment in Berlin in 1971 by Brig. Tony Pielow when he was Commanding and when Major Ron Morris was the Quartermaster. They were allocated to Companies and carried on parade on ceremonial occasions.

THE PRINCESS OF WALES'S ROYAL REGIMENT (QUEEN'S AND ROYAL HAMPSHIRES)

After the splendid ceremonial of the Royal Review of the Regiment by HRH The Princess of Wales at Canterbury on 9 June, life for the battalions quickly returned to normal. The 1st Battalion trained for Northern Ireland and deployed to the Province in September. The 2nd Battalion ran the United Kingdom Land Forces Mortar Concentration on Salisbury Plain and then also trained for Ulster before moving there in early December. The 5th Battalion had their TA camp at Wathgill and the 6th/7th Battalion went for theirs in Okehampton.

Ceremonial has not been completely forgotten, however. B (Queen's Regiment) Company took their rightful place at the Inauguration Parade of the newly formed London Regiment at the Duke of York's Headquarters on 1 August, and our 1st Battalion band is participating in a tour of North America this autumn by a composite band of The Queen's Division.

As The Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment celebrated its first birthday in September it looked back with pride on several sporting successes. The Regiment has won both the Infantry Football and Infantry Cricket Championships, the Army Judo Competition and the Territorial Army Orienteering. It was also runner-up in the Army Boxing and secured a handsome clutch of medals in the Cambrian Patrol Competitions.



TYNDARIOS MEMORIAL STONE HEADS HOME

A 2-ton memorial to an almost forgotten World War 1 tragedy is on its way to Britain, courtesy of Sappers mom the Queen's Gurkha Engineers.

The men of the Plant Section, 70 Support Squadron, Queens Gurkha Engineers, were called in to recover the 1-metre high Tyndarios Stone from its position high on The Peak on Hong Kong Island. It has been there for some 70 years, erected by the Commanding Officer of the 25th Battalion of The Middlesex Regiment, Lt-Col'John Ward, CB, CMG, MP Stoke on Trent, in memory of the men of his battalion who died when their troopship 'Tyndarios' struck a German mine off South Africa in 1917. The Tyndarios was on passage to Hong Kong where the battalion was to take up Garrison duties.

The stone is now in storage in Hong Kong awaiting shipment to the United Kingdom where it will pass into the hands of the Middlesex Regimental Association, who have arranged for the National Army Museum to accept this memorial for display.

In early 1941 he was seconded to the FMSVF Malaya. In February 1942 he was taken POW and held in No. 1 Camp, Thailand. He was repatriated to the U.K. in late 1945 and was eventually marked fit to continue serving and joined the 1st Bn in 1947 serving until 1955 when he was discharged to pension with 28 years service. Alf was a fine all round sportsman excelling at Boxing, Athletics, Swimming and Water Polo.

Our sincere thanks must go to Capt R.S. Kennedy who took a great interest and care of Alf. He arranged Alf's funeral in Staffordshire. The Regimental Flag draped the coffin and a maroon and old gold wreath was provided bearing the message "Thank you Alf for all the good things you did for your regiment". I have received and replied to a letter from his niece, Geraldine Rigdon, who lives in U.S.A.

FLAVELL - On 29 November 1993, Brigadier Edwin William Conquest Flavell, DSO, MC, TD, DL, after 95 years. A full obituary will appear in the next issue of the Newsletter.

FRY - On 17 July 1993, Private Sidney Arthur Fry (6206601), aged 73 years. He served with 1/7th Bn 1939-40 and 3 Commando 1941-43, was wounded and medically downgraded and discharged on 7 March 1946.

During World War 1 he served with the 2nd Bn from 1914-18. Two years ago he presented to our regimental museum his Cap Badge and a Cigarette case presented to him by the Mayoress of Ramsgate on 29th January 1919.

HEATHER – On 14 June 1993, Sgt Charles Heather (6200185), aged 77 years.

Charlie Heather enlisted at Mill Hill in 1934 and after recruit training and a short spell with the 2nd Bn joined the 1st Bn in Egypt, Singapore and Hong Kong followed and his POW days commenced on 25th December 1941. He became one of the ill-fated draft to embark on the Lisbon Maru for Japan and the ship was torpedoed by the Americans and 800 were drowned etc. Charlie survived and was picked up and taken to Shanghai – he was too ill to be moved to Japan, and with 7 others was left on the Shanghai Docks. He spent the next 3 years in a Jap POW Camp in Shanghai which housed all nationalities and some American airmen. Charlies fate was unknown until late 1945 when he was suddenly repatriated to UK to the delight of his family. He was a fine specimen of manhood, being a strong and athletic type with good looks and a lot of personality.

As editor and a former POW I have searched to find Heather and all the time he was living 12 miles from me, i.e. Ashford, Kent. I have visited his widow and I find that Charlie wanted to live quietly feeling rather ashamed that his health and physical well being had left him a sad person. Such is life. I find that Charlie had a son who emigrated to New Zealand, so I gave him two addresses of Diehards and they have all now met up and compared notes. I have a feeling that Blondie Phillips fought Charlie in an inter company boxing match.

Without my knowledge the family approached the 5th Bn The Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment TA, who came up trumps and supplied a bugler to sound Last Post and Reveille. What a nice gesture. A happy end to another regimental obituary. I now keep in touch with Doris Heather.

JESSOP - On 17 October 1993, WO2 Leslie Jessop (14188539), aged 65 years. Less Jessop served with our regiment and made his mark as a pleasant and all round adaptable Warrant Officer. I have forgotten the period he was with us but remember very well his whiskers and a photograph of him laying on a bed, beret and whiskers at the ready. I asked his widow if he wore that appendage when he got married and she said no and never again. This is how we remember him with affection.

HARRISON – On 16th September 1993, Sgt Richard Arthur Harrison (6211282), aged 75 years. Richard enlisted on 15 January 1940 and was posted to 342 MGTC, Gosport, and on completion of his training was posted to the 2nd Bn and joined the Signal Platoon. OLDHAM - On 30 July 1993, Captain John Hugh Oldham. He was commissioned into the 7th Bn on 1 July 1936. No other information available.

PALMER – On 2 December 1993, Sgt George Palmer (6200376), aged 79 years.

Pedlar Palmer enlisted on 18 January 1932 and on completion of recruit training joined C(MG)

Company, 2nd Bn. In 1938 he was posted to the Depot until 1941, when he rejoined the 2nd Bn

remaining until 1948. He landed with the 2nd Bn in Normandy on 6 June 1944 (Operation OVERLORD).

In June 1949 he proceeded with the 1st Bn to Hong Kong and on to Korea, returning to UK in December

1952. He was then posted to the Depot and finally discharged to pension on 11 October 1961. In civilian

life became a caretaker. He occupied a Regimental Flat at Albuhera Close. He was a very popular

member of the WOs and Sgts Mess spending many hours behind the bar. A real regimental character.

H - On 7 August 1993, Mrs Desdemmona (Joan) Rich, wife of Major E.F.J. Rich, MC, TD.

QUINLAN - On 15 October 1993, Father Terence quinlan, aged 84 years.

He was Roman Catholic Chaplain to 27th Infantry Brigade, and attached to 1 Mx, Hong Kong and Korea.

STONE - On 11 November 1993, Sgt William Richard Stone (6201255), aged 78 years.

Dick Stone enlisted on 30 August 1933 and on completion of recruit training joined the 2nd Bn until March 1936 when he was posted to the 1st Bn in Singapore. In august 1937 he moved with the Bn to Hong Kong. During the Battle of Hong Kong he was wounded and taken POW and held in Shamshuipo Camp until August 1945 when he was repatriated to UK and medically discharged. Dick was seriously diabled and suffered for the rest of his life. He obtained employment with the Corps of Commissionairs and served for 28 years reaching the rank of Sergeant Major retiring at the age of 60. A very well liked and popular member of the 1st Bn.

STREET – During July 1993, Colonel Douglas Street, aged 77 years.

Shortly before the 1939 war Douglas Street was commissioned and served with the 1/7th Bn joining C Company, serving with the Bn in the 3rd Division. After evacuation from Dunkirk he became Chief Instructor on the Intelligence Corps Staff Course. Subsequently he became Head of the B.B.C's German and Austrian Service and took up a post in the Foreign Office in 1945. He was awarded the Belgian Croix de Guerre.

WHINNEY - On 22 November 1993, Private Alan Robert Whinney (6896280), aged 74 years. He served with distinction in the 2/7th Bn seeing service in North Africa, Italy and Palestine. WORLEY - On 4 August 1993, Private Frederick Albert Worley (6210993), aged 75 years.

He served with distinction in the 2/7th Bn seeing service in Italy. He was badly wounded and received a disability pension in 1944. Many friends from Albuhera Close attended the funeral.

WALLER – On 6 August 1993, Private John William Waller (6208364), aged 81 years.

John Volunteered for service in May 1940 and was a member of the last draft to reach the 1st Bn in Hong Kong. On 25 December 1941 he became a POW and was held in Shamshuipo Camp. On 15 February 1942, the day Singapore surrendered John was told that he had been selected for an important job and he was taken to the Peninsula Hotel to be interviewed. He was introduced to Sir Mark Young and became his manservant. The following day they were both flown to Formosa and after lunch on to Shanghai and finally to Karenko Camp which held all the senior officers captured, American, Dutch and British. They were finally moved to a new prison camp, near Mukden, Manchuria.

Raised separately in India and China, the reader follows these children of Empire as they meet in Malaya, when world events pull them into the Pacific War, the horror of the Hong Kong Battle and the terrifying Fall of Singapore. Escaping from a Japanese prison camp, Anthony journeys through China to India, meets Elizabeth in wartorn London and joins battle again in France. Inexorably their lives were drawn together – an exciting and compelling story.

A successful combination of experience and fact, CORRIDORS OF TIME will appeal to all, the historian will be affected by its range, humanitarians by the extraordinary strength of character in adversity.

A.W.O.L. by Maj Guy Weymouth MBE, late RWK (and Regimental Headquarters 1966-84). In an Italian Prison Camp and subsequent adventures on the run in Italy 1943 - 1944.

Guy Weymouth was a subaltern in the 6th Queen's Own Royal West Kent's when the events related in this book took place. After some severe fighting in Tunisia, he was captured at the infamous Bald Hill in November 1942. Flown to mainland Italy, he was first incarcerated at the transit camp at Capua, then in the POW cage at Chieti.

After 10 months as a POW, during which he became involved in a tunnelling syndicate, he lived on his wits (and no mean portion of help from local peasants) behind the German lines in Italy for over three months. This time was not spent idly, and after several frustrated attempts involving boats, opportunity presented itself to break through the lines, where he and his two companions discovered to their delight that all thirteen of their fellow escapers had made it to safety.

Among his remarkable experiences was that of spending Christmas 1943 sharing the rations of a German Artillery unit, and his fortunate encounter with a flamboyant Yugoslav count hiding out from the Germans in the same region and known and respected by the local peasantry as Don Luigi.

SOLDIERS OF THE QUEEN - The History of the Queen's Regiment 1966 - 1992.

The announcement under the 'Options for Change' Defence Cuts in late 1991 that The Queen's Regiment would both amalgamate and reduce in size came as a bolt out of the blue. The subsequent publicity in both the local and national Press was widespread but could not save the Regiment. At the time of the surprise announcement, the Regiment was preparing to celebrate its 25th anniversary, having been formed on 31st December 1966 from four much older Regiments.

"Soldiers of The Queen" – The History of The Queen's Regiment 1966 - 1992' was originally commissioned as part of the celebrations surrounding the first 25 years of the Regiment. In the aftermath of 'Options', celebrations were clearly out, but it was decided to expand the book as a complete record and memorial to the life of The Queen's Regiment, from formation to disbandment.

In form, the book follows a long precedent set by all the forebear Regiments, all of whom had multi-volume histories. The book has both general sections dealing with an overview of military affairs as well as illed sections on each of the Regiment's battalions. Much of the book is about active operations, with hern Ireland featuring large.

The book contains over 200 photographs which provide an unmatched record of the British Army since 1966. There are also some 30 maps; and numerous annexes dealing with particular aspects of Regimental life. It will interest not only past and present members of the Regiment; but also serious students of military affairs; and anyone with an interest in militaria.

Apart from that, the Dinner was a great success, particularly as our Guest Speaker was so well known to somany, Colonel Andrew Man of the Middlesex Regiment, now perhaps the senior survivor of all those who left Hong Kong in 1950 for the very first of the actions under the flag of the United Nations, and there were a few of his old battalion dining with us commemorating a Regimental friendship that goes back over one hundred years.

Present readers will associate the Middlesex Regiment with places like Hill 282 and Sariwon and Kunu-Ri but their fathers would have thought of Le Cateau and Armentieres in 1914, when the Commanding Officer of the 1st Middlesex, Colonel Ward, was killed leading two of his companies to relieve B and C Companies of the 93rd who had been cut off by a German counter attack. There is an old Gaelic saying 'Friends are good in the Day of Battle' and it is on the 8th Battalion Memorial at Beaumont Hamel. It is nice to think that one such friendship still survives s strongly.

So much for history, which explains why Colonel Andrew Man and his Regiment hold such a special place with us.

The Toast to the Regiment was responded to by the Colonel of the Regiment who updated us on the latest news and progress of the Regiment, also the Association.
