

Museum Appeal.

Phase 1 of this Appeal, which was reported in the last issue of the Newsletter, is still continuing and donations have now reached a total of $\mathfrak{L}4,617$ plus the covenants which also have increased to just under $\mathfrak{L}1,200$ a year. This is a most heartening response and the Trustees are extremely grateful for this support from the old Die Hards. The value of the covenants cannot be over emphasised; for example we have been able to recover the sum of $\mathfrak{L}467$ from the Inland Revenue for the year ending 5 April 1982 and this of course will be added to the investment of the Museum funds and so increase the annual income. Every contribution, however small, is most welcome and very much appreciated.

We are greatly indebted to the late Mrs. M. Hull, aunt of Major B.K. Clayden, who specifically bequeathed the magnificent sum of £1,240 to our Regimental Museum. This sum is also being added to the investments. Our special thanks go to Major Ken Clayden for the important part that he played as an executor of Mrs. Hull's will in arranging this most generous legacy, which is so greatly appreciated.

Phase II of the Appeal, that is its extension to the public and institutions, firms, etc., within the old County of Middlesex is being delayed pending further consideration by the Trustees of advice from the professional consultants as to the means and methods of implementing this phase of the Appeal. However the Trustees are fully expecting to go ahead with Phase II in the autumn.

Acquisitions and Upkeep.

Once more we must express our thanks to the Lilley Benevolent Trust who have again donated £100 to the Museum Fund for the purchase and upkeep of 9th Battalion exhibits. We are indeed most grateful for their continuing and generous support.

The Curator, Major Dick Smith, has been incapacitated for the past three weeks and consequently has been unable to make his usual contribution to the museum notes concerning acquisitions and presentations received during the past six months but will do so in the next issue of the newsletter.

Museum Accommodation.

The Haringey Museum and Arts Service which is responsible for and controls all the museum accommodation in Bruce Castle, where our Regimental Museum is housed, is to undertake a major reorganisation of the space available within the Castle. As a consequence our museum is being allocated completely new-accommodation which will consist of one room on the first floor sufficiently large enough to house the complete display of regimental memorabilia. Also two small adjoining rooms, one possibly suitable for a separate medal display and the other for uniforms and miscellaneous items, are being made available to us, plus extra storage space. Security will be much improved as there will be one entrance and over all the move to this new accommodation will be a great improvement.

A representative of the Ogilby Trust, who has seen the plans and has approved the move, is actively helping in obtaining a grant for the Haringey Museum authorities to part off-set the costs. Meetings are taking place with the Controller of Haringey Museum and Arts Services and the Curator of Bruce Castle to plan the detailed presentation and display arrangements, and it is the intention to re-arrange the exhibits in a chronological order so as to reflect the history of our Regiment and its county connections. It is anticipated that the move will take place in the early autumn.

REGIMENTAL CHAPEL IN ST PAUL'S CATHEDRAL

Our Chapel in the Cathedral is probably the most important and the most enduring of our various memorials. Therefore it behoves us to do all we can now, particularly whilst there still are quite a number of Die Hards around to appreciate it, to enhance and preserve this monument to our great regimental heritage.

The Chairman of the Regimental Association, Lt-Col T.W. Chattey, OBE, has therefore set up a regimental committee consisting of Brig B.A.M. Pielow and Col A.R. Waller, MBE, MC, with the following terms of reference:

"To examine and to make recommendations for preserving and furthering our presence in the Regimental Chapel in St Paul's Cathedral".

He was a first class cricketer and played for Essex whenever his military duties allowed. Towards the end of 1938 he decided to play full time cricket for Essex and applied for and was granted premature retirement. With the advent of the Second World War 'Steve' was recalled to the Colours and joined the 2nd Bn then at Gosport. He saw service with this Bn at Dunkirk. Promotion to Major in 1942. On 26 April 1942 he was posted to the 1/7th Bn and appointed to command with rank of temporary Lt-Col. He commanded the 1/7th Bn (51st Highland Division) until August 1945, throughout the North African, Sicilian and Italian campaigns earning the DSO in 1944 and being mentioned in dispatches twice. He retired from the Army in 1946 and became a director of the Time-Life publishing company and of course returned to his beloved cricket. STUBBS - On 27 May 1982, Captain Jimmy M. Stubbs, MC.

Colonel Desmond Ellis writes:

All who knew Jimmy will be sorry to learn of his untimely death. He had suffered a protracted and terminal disease with great fortitude, which was typical of him. He joined the 2/8th(1st Bn) in 1943 serving with D Company (4.2 Mortars). He was posted back to Normandy with them and then joined B Company (MMG) in September 1944, commanding 7 Pl. He was held in the highest respect by his Platoon Sgt — Les Page — and all ranks. He was wounded twice but always returned to us. His gallantry and qualities of leadership were unsurpassable and this was brought home to us by one of his toughest and roughest soldiers saying to him "Governor, I wouldn't still anything off you unless I was very hard pressed". His well earned Military Cross was won when he and Cpl French, a teenager, went forward from the FDL's on the salient east of Goch and shot up the Germans who were holding up the Division on our flank. It was for their gallant action and initiative that they received the M.C. and M.M. respectively.

Capt Stubbs was himself a very good middle weight boxer and led the 1st Bn team. He left the army in 1946. Colonel W.D. Ellis attended the funeral.

WELLER - On 7 May 1982, Major Sidney Charles William (Sam) Weller, MBE, MM, (6200191 and 426507), aged 69 years.

Sam Weller enlisted at the Great Scotland Yard recruiting Office on 21 August 1931 in the R.A.S.C. but transferred to the Middlesex Regiment on 31 August 1931. After completion of his recruit training he was posted to the Depot Permanent Staff as batman to Major T.S. Wollocombe. In May 1934 he was posted to the 2nd Bn at Colchester and was promoted Cpl in the July. On 20 August 1938 he was transferred to the Army Reserve on completion of his engagement. He joined the Metropolitan Police and passed out the week war was declared. As a reservist he was immediately recalled to the Colours and joined the 2nd Bn at Colchester and was promoted Sgt. He was with the 2nd Bn at Dunkirk and went to France with them on D Day. On 13 April 1945 he was awarded the Military Medal for fine leadership during a counter attack. Then came service with the 2nd Bn in Egypt and Palestine and return to the UK in July 1947. He was promoted WOI(RSM) and posted to the 1st Bn in BAOR. Posting to the Depot on 5 July 1948 as RSM was followed by posting to Hong Kong and the 1st Bn. He served with the Bn throughout Korea and returned to UK in November 1952. On 20 December 1952 he was granted a regular Quartermaster Commission and appointed Q.M. of the Depot where he remained until the Depot closed in 1961. In July 1961 he was posted to 5 Mx T.A. as Q.M. He was promoted Major on 11 April 1962. In the New Years Honours List of 1966 he was awarded the M.B.E. and retired on 5 February 1966. He was in possession of the following medals - MBE, MM, 1939/45 Star, France & Germany Star, Defence Medal, War Medal 1939/45, General Service Medal (Palestine), Korea Medal, United Nations Medal, LS & GC Medal and the Cadet Forces Medal.

After retirement he joined the Middlesex T&AFAssn as Superintendent of Central Stores and was appointed to a QM Commission with the Army Cadet Force in February 1966 retiring once again on 2 February 1979. From 1967 to the day he died Sam Weller was the Housing Manager to our Memorial Homes at Albuhera Close, Enfield. Thus ended over 50 years of faithful, loyal an unstinting service to his regiment. In his younger days he was a fine all round athlete. A true Die

Hard indeed.

His funeral was attended by many members of the regiment. His widow, Mrs. Rose Weller, has asked me to say how sorry she was that it was not possible to thank them all personally and also to record how much she appreciated all the letters of sympathy that were received.

WORTON - On 4 May 1982, Ex Private Frederick Worton (16101 and 6908155), aged 84 years. He was admitted to the Royal Hospital Chelsea as an In Pensioner on 6 September 1965 and was a resident until the day he died.

His service totalled 20 years serving with the following units – Mx 11 August 1915 to 5 November 1917; Labour Corps 6 November 1917 to 15 April 1919; Rifle Brigade 25 August 1919 to 17 July 1922; Welsh Regiment 6 March 1923 to 30 June 1925; Mx 1 July 1925 to 13 November 1935.

Fred was a great stalwart and regularly attended the regimental ceremony at the Field of Remembrance, Westminster, where always performed the duty of escort to the Regimental Association Standard.

He was in possession of the following medals – British War Medal, Victory Medal, Indian General Service Medal (1921-24), Defence Medal, War Medal 1939/45 and the LS and GC Medal.

WRAITH - On 17 December 1981, Ex Cpl Mony Wraith (6198496), aged 70 years.
His period of service was from 1928 to 1935 all with the 1st Bn. At one time he was Q.M. Storeman.

Lt-Col J.W.A. (Steve) Stephenson, DSO

Major Barry Reed gave the following address at the Memorial Service held on Wednesday, 16 June 1982 :

In expressing our heartfelt sympathy to John and Susan, Jenifer and Shirley, and their families, on their great loss; all will wish to tell them how much we appreciate this opportunity to salute and give thanks for the life of their dear father, our good friend Lt-Col John William Arthur Stephenson, DSO.

Like me, many of you may have been unaware that those were his correct names; for everyone in list church knew and loved him as that irrepressible, warm hearted man with the extraordinarily infectious laugh – 'Steve'.

Maybe you served with him as a young subaltern in India, played with him on the cricket field, fought over long dusty miles with him in the desert, allowed him to persuade you to buy advertising in Picture Post or Life, partnered him at golf or simply enjoyed a glass of Guiness with him — to all of us he was 'Steve', or just occasionally 'Darkie' or 'Jack'; a man whose sheer personality and charm demanded an affectionate nickname.

For those of us, probably the majority, who only knew him since the war, since he married his dear Peggy, he was the quintessence of a family man, a man who helped to bring up the two children of a young widow and who had the joy to father two offspring of his own. He could always tell a good story and was probably too hearty for many on the 8.10 from Gerrards Cross to Marylebone. His American colleagues from Time-Life particularly enjoyed him as a very pukka Englishman. His nieces and nephews were devoted to him and he gave them many a helping hand. But above all he was a happy, contented husband, father and grandfather who had just adjusted to retirement in Pulborough, when tragically Peggy died far too soon and far too young.

That, of course, is only one half of 'Steve's' life, the second. The first, of almost equal length, was the years of perhaps his most outstanding achievements, which, since he was essentially a modest man, you may have heard little if anything about. Indeed, standing here I have the feeling that if I extoll him overmuch a cricket ball may land with a bang on my head.

Arriving in this world at Hong Kong and being taken shortly afterward to India at the height of the Raj. 'Steve' was a true son of Empire and of the British Army. His father, Bunjie Stephenson, then a major in the 3rd Battalion the Middlesex Regiment was to be killed 8 years later, in 1915, gallantly leading his men at the 2nd Battle of Ypres. His name heads the list, on Ypres' Menin Gate, of those that gave their life.

Orphaned by his mother's death a few years later, 'Steve' went to school at Clayesmore and spent the holidays in the somewhat Victorian atmosphere of an uncle's house in Beaconsfield. But, all games were his forte and not unnaturally the army his main ambition; so arriving at Sandhurst in 1925, he truly came into his own.

Commissioned into his father's old Regiment, where should he go but straight to India, the land of his childhood. There the cockney soldiers regarded him with affection as "a favoured brat" but he soon made his mark both at soldiering and, of course, at sport. He played cricket several times for the Madras Presidency and as one newspaper recalls "did exceptionally well, both at batting and bowling". Back with the 2nd Middlesex to Colchester in 1931 he soon started, as regularly as his duties would allow, to appear for Essex and five years later reached the pinnacle of his bowling career. Reading through the press cuttings of 1936, one realises just how close he came to being an all time cricketing great. That year's Gentlemen versus Players game at Lords was heralded as "Stephenson's Match" — he took 9 wickets for 46 runs in the 1st Innings, claiming such famous names as Hammond, Leyland, Hardstaff, Verity and Gover. But perhaps it is the comments about the man that are most telling:

"Throughout the whole game he was the live wire cheered by all and sundry".

"Stephenson could hardly contain himself. He did a dance when he got Hardstaff. He raised both hands to high heaven when Gover was caught".

"Nothing like his mercurial enthusiasm can be recalled"

"He has thoroughly inspiring fervour tinged with a gaiety good for the game".

"There is no more daring fieldsman in contemporary English cricket".

So it was a tremendous blow to all his many fans when he was not selected for the Australian Tour that Winter. Characteristically he soon got over his personal disappointment went on to Captain Essex

the following season and then decided to retire from the army to devote himself to first class cricket. Within less than a year he was back with 2nd Middlesex which arrived in France on the last day of September 1939. Typically "B" Company Commander's car flew a bat and ball pennant and his 21/C was quickly requested to organise an improvised net during that winter of the phoney war. But then came the German attack and the retreat to Dunkirk, with the Battalion led by that most distinguished soldier, Jock Horrocks.

The following two years were spent exercising and training in various parts of the U.K. until in late 1941 'Steve's' unit moved to Chalfont St Giles where I believe he first met, and a few months la married, Peggy.

Soon came promotion to Lieutenant Colonel when he took command of 1/7th Middlesex, a Territorial Battalion, attached as machine gunners to the 51st Highland Division. In Summer 1942 they sailed via South Africa for Egypt in good time for the Battle of Alamein that October. Then onwards through Tripoli, the Marenth Line, CSfax, Tunis and eventually Bizerta. Later came Sicily and Anzio

Concerning 'Steve's' part in that famous North African victory, the Regimental Historian wrote:

"Throughout the whole campaign the Commanding Officer had been tireless in his work for the Battalion. No platoon was too far off for him to visit. His energy and experience had brought his men up to a high pitch of excellence. His D.S.O. — news of which came through at this time — had been well earned by skill and tireless energy".

Each of you will have your own memories of this gifted cricketer, gallant officer, father and friend so I will let his story rest there; closing with these lines of which, as a good samaritan, I believe 'Steve' would have approved.

"If I should go before the rest of you Break not a flower, nor inscribe a stone Nor when I'm gone speak in a Sunday voice But be the usual selves that I have known".

Other patients are asked to pay at the rate of £280 per week for a private room and £245 for a shared room or ward bed. If, however a patient can pay a sum nearer to the actual cost of his maintenance (now over £560 per week) this is much appreciated as it helps others. Consultant's fees are a matter for personal arrangement between patient and Consultant. There is a generously administered Benevolent Fund for those in straightened circumstances.

ST DAVID'S HOME FOR DISABLED SOLDIERS, SAILORS AND AIRMEN

St. David's Home was founded in 1918 to provide for disabled ex-servicemen a home where a pidly welcome, sympathetic care and medical attention are assured.

The Home is run by the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, under the direction of a Committee of Management, and aided by a staff of nurses and care assistants. Patients of various disabilities and of all denominations are welcomed. Fifty Six men are accommodated in premises all on the ground floor. There are two Wards which are divided into individual units, one open plan Ward, and five small rooms. All are fitted with coloured televisions. There is a large day room where the men can relax, enjoy concerts, play games or watch television. The Physiotherapy Unit is equipped with every modern equipment through the generosity of the Army Benevolent Fund, there is also a section for Occupational Therapy. The Librarian goes around each week with a variety of loan books from the St. John & Red Cross Hospital Library. Outings are provided throughout the year from various 'Lest we Forget Organisations', also the men enjoy many drives and outings in our Ambulance presented by our ever generous friends the Army Benevolent Fund.
