



Major Ron Morris MBE

A cunningly engineered conversation with Ron Morris some years ago at a Queen's Regiment drinks party, when he was still the Emergency Planning Officer with the London Borough of Hammersmith and Fulham, gave me the opportunity to quiz him about his future and to suggest he took over as our Regimental Secretary when Frank Waldron retired. His agreement to do so was just about the best thing I have achieved for the Association.

He first joined us as the Quartermaster of the 1st Battalion in Holywood Barracks Belfast moving to 4 QUEENS when the large Regiment was formed. When the 4 QUEENS disbanded he went to 1 QUEENS in Berlin as the Battalion's outstandingly efficient and hard working supplier of quartermastering miracles which confirmed him as a Diehard and built an early reputation. 1 QUEENS left Berlin in 72 for Bulford. Ron stayed with them as the QM moving to Werl in 75. Then in 77 he returned to Berlin and joined the Staff of Berlin Infantry Brigade, working his well known wonders there before he went to the Divisional Depot at Bassingbourn for his last posting before retiring to sort out Hammersmith Council in a manner never before suffered by them and one suspects never forgotten. He became our Association Secretary on Albuhera Day 1993 a post he handed over on 1 June to Major Dennis Bradley at the HQ PWRR.

Having had the real pleasure of working with Ron on an almost daily basis since May '93 I can say without any hesitation that he has single handedly kept the Association alive and firmly on the rails. Accompanied invariably by his ever cheerful and uniformly popular and regimentally active wife Betty, he has organised and/or attended every function we have ever had. Apart from the all important maintenance of contact with our members and their families, his remit has included, reunions, lunches, dinners, church services, National Army Museum functions, branch occasions, our input to PWRR functions and old comrades funerals. All this as well as handling the regular production of the Newsletter. Indeed every single regimental activity has had the Ron Morris signature and its invariable success has been thanks to Ron's immaculate planning and involvement.

His fancifully described "part time" employment in the Association has in fact been a 24 hour a day involvement, as the many of us who are constantly phoning or writing to him will readily endorse. He has been a compassionate and expert handler of hundreds of personal matters, as well as a sound provider of financial advice.

We will fortunately not be losing all of Ron's expertise. He will continue to run the Officers' Club and will be one of the members of the newly slimmed-down Association Executive Committee which will thus benefit from his wide-ranging knowledge and regimental background.

Every member of the Association has a lot to thank Ron and Betty for and I believe each of us is well aware of that particular debt. I certainly am.

THE PRINCESS OF WALES'S ROYAL REGIMENT

Since the last edition much has happened on the world stage. The war in Iraq has been fought and won thanks to a combination of modern equipment and sheer bravery. The muddle and the confusion surrounding the firemen's strike never went away with 19,000 service personnel still on standby during the war. At the time of writing this report the muddle still continues. We as a Regiment or a Battalion were not deployed to Iraq, however, we had approximately 50 All Ranks in the war zone and another 40 All Ranks in Afghanistan.

The 1st Battalion continues its armoured warrior role in Tidworth. It will in the near future form part of a Brigade as the follow on force for Iraq. Training must now take priority after the firemen's strike deployment has completely changed any proposed training programmes, (eg an exercise that took over a year to plan was cancelled at 48 hours notice due to the firemen's strike!). The Battalion goes to Canada in August/September 2003 to carry out the all important live firing exercises (Armoured Warrior) required to tune their tactics ready for Iraq,

If Op Fresco (Firemen's Strike) continues the Battalion will once again take over responsibility for the South London Area 250 troops with a further 250 troops committed and deployed to Northern Ireland. They will man the Green Goddesses. The Battalion is in fine form recruited to over establishment and looking forward to the next few months.

The 2nd Battalion has now settled into life at the new barracks at Ternhill (Shropshire). Their exercise to Kenya that was due to take place in January and February 2003 was cancelled at short notice due to the looming war in Iraq and the Firemen's strike not being resolved. They will proceed on a six months tour to Northern Ireland in June 2003. They are now concentrating on specialist training for the Province at Lydd Ranges. The Colonel in Chief visited them on 16 May (Albuhera Day) at Lydd and had an excellent day.

The 3rd Battalion is now under the command of Lieut Colonel Tony Guthrie. The previous CO Lieut Colonel Patrick Crowley is now ensconced as a DS at Shrivenham having had a very successful tour. The Battalion have provided the main element of a Composite TA Rifle Company for deployment to Afghanistan – ie approx 40 All Ranks. This will be an exciting deployment and will commence in June 2003 for six months. The Battalion also provided 8 members for compulsory call out for the recent war in Iraq and also 5 ORs who are deployed to Bosnia, Kosovo and Cyprus all in support of the Regular Army. In addition the Battalion is forming the Civic Contingency Reaction Force (CCRF) with the HQ based in Canterbury. This force would be used in the event of a terrorist problem or a natural major disaster. Annual Camp 2003 will be in Sennybridge.

B Company The London Regiment.

The Company recently had a good Annual Camp in Sennelager. They have also provided 3 ORs for deployment to Afghanistan and had a couple of compulsory reservist call ups for Iraq. Annual Camp 2003 will be Dartmoor.

C Company The Rifle Volunteers

C Company provides the highest percentage of soldiers for Full Time Reserve Service from the Battalion (ie those volunteering for a fixed term deployment with the Regular Army). They have 5 for Afghanistan, 2 for Iraq and more for Cyprus and Kosovo. Annual Camp last year was in the Ukraine and in 2003 it will be in Lithuania.

As can be seen there is a strong reliance on the part time soldier to support the Regular Army operations. This is excellent and well carried out by our volunteer soldiers.

The Regiment is in fine form and once the firemen's strike can be resolved life should get back to the correct level of training and operations. We await the next conflict?

A PILGRIMAGE TO THE IBERIAN PENINSULAR

For the thirteenth time the Hounslow Branch returned to the Iberian Peninsular to continue that special affinity which exists between the Regiment and the towns of Albuhera and Elvas where Major General Daniel Hoghton, who commanded the Brigade in which the 57th of Foot acquitted themselves so well on the 16th of May 1811, is buried.

So on Thursday the 15th of May the Branch attended the ceremony, held this year earlier than is normal, to accommodate a party of Royal Fusiliers who were due to leave Spain before the following Sunday. The ceremony included the inauguration of a new gravestone to Lt Col Daniel White of the 29th of Foot who died in Elvas as a result of wounds sustained at La Albuera. Present for the first time was Sir Bernard Hoghton Bt DL who expressed his feelings by saying it was a very happy day, full of emotion and dedication. A short service was conducted by the Chaplain of Regimento de Infanteria No 8, in the presence of Ronaldo Almeida the Mayor of Elvas, Major Halladie and a large group of the Friends of the British Cemetery. It is believed to be the oldest British Military Cemetery in Europe and is located in the bastion of S Joao de Corujeiro at Elvas and is open to the public. The Branch laid a wreath on behalf of the Regiment at the tablets that were erected in the cemetery in May 2001. After the sounding of Toque dos Mortes, two minutes silence and the Alvorada those present adjourned for lunch which was held at Quinta Santo Antonia where Richard Thornton and John Raby acted as unpaid salesmen for the Friends selling plates, Christmas Cards and other memorabilia.

In the evening we were entertained by Don Enrique Rubio on his Estate in Spain and were taken to see a new location, to add to our knowledge of the battle, the hill where the Spanish Contingent held mass before they proceeded to take their place in the Allied line. May the 16th is by now a familiar programme and as is customary, we gathered in the plaza in company with many distinguished dignitaries and the Spanish Army Contingent, for the usual speeches, raising of national flags and the laying wreaths to all the participants in the battle. The Army contingent sang the lament, which is always very moving, before marching past the saluting base where the salute was taken by a Spanish General. Mike Ward presented, on behalf of the Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment, a fine trophy to be awarded annually to the pupil in the village school who makes the most progress in the English language, which was won this year by a young girl. The citizens of La Albuera all represent members of the various regiments present at the battle and the ladies of the village produce authentic replicas of the old uniforms. In the evening all the regiments that have been created, assemble and march to the Los Campomentos, and they entertain the very large crowds that now attend the anniversary of the battle. Then on the Saturday and the Sunday a well staged and realistically performed recreation of the battle took place.

ODD JOTTINGS

He was doing a tour of his friends located in the south of England to wish them well for Christmas. After leaving me he went on to see Brigadier Tony Pielow. Harry Alcock rang to wish me a merry Christmas and to tell me that whilst reading the entry about Rendsburg in the December Newsletter, received that morning, there was knock on the door and a parcel containing Christmas goodies was delivered having travelled all the way from Heinz Johannsen in Rendsburg. Harry said that Heinz never forgets him at Christmas.

Major Flack served with the 2/7th Battalion from January 1943 until December 1945 when he moved to HQ Cairo District and joined the Staff as DAQMG.

HARRAGAN – Jack, who served with the 1/8th Battalion from 1940 – 1945 died on the 30th of April 2003. His funeral was held at Llanelli Crematorium on the 9th of May 2003.

JUPP – Ronald David (Ronnie) died on Friday the 13th of December 2002 aged 82. Ronnie served with the 2/8th Battalion throughout World War Two. He was in regular contact with the Association and only a short while ago he told me that his group of comrades from the 2/8th who used to meet monthly at a local pub to remember the old days had had to call it a day, as due to the ages of them all, it was becoming too difficult to travel. His funeral was held at the Breakspear Crematorium Ruislip on the 23rd of December 2002. There was a large gathering of family and friends to say farewell. Captain John Lofting was present to represent the Regiment. A reception was held after the funeral at the Moore Park Golf Club.

KAY - P C (known as Sandy) died peacefully at home on the 4th of April 2003. He was a National Service Subaltern with the 1st Battalion during 1947/48. He went on to complete his National Service Commitment with the TA joining the 7th Battalion following in the footsteps of his father, also called Sandy Kay, who commanded the 1/7th Battalion between 1917 and 1918. The funeral was held on the 11th of April at All Saint's, Moreton, Norfolk.

LEONARD – Conrad died on the 19th of April 2003 at the age of 104. Not known to us but it was picked up from The DailyTelegraph that he served as an Officer in the Regiment during World War One.

LIDDELL - Peter died on the 21st of February 2003 after suffering a long illness. He was a National Service Officer with the Wiltshire Regiment and after his full time service he joined the 7th Battalion for the rest of his National Service Commitment. He resigned his commission in 1954 to join the Colonial Police Force in Uganda. Subsequently, when Uganda obtained its independence, he joined the Sultan of Oman's Forces in Muscat. The details of his funeral are not known to us.

MOORE – Herbert Joseph, 14726469 died on the 20th of February 2003 just short of his 80th birthday. It is thought that he served with the 1st Battalion from at least 1943 as he was in France in 1944 but his brother, who told us that he had died, was not sure of the actual dates of service. He did know that he served in Hong Kong and was with the Battalion in Korea and was a member of the Battalion Boxing Team. His funeral was held at the Bluebell Hill Crematorium, Kent on the 4th of March 2003.

NAISH E J (Jim) died on the 4th of May 2003 in Salisbury Hospital. He was commissioned into the Regiment in 1943 but served with the Royal Hampshire Regiment in Italy and Austria during 1944 and 1945. He joined the 2nd Battalion and served with them from 1945 to 1947 when he was demobbed. He rejoined the TA when it reformed and was posted to 254 Field Regiment RA moving subsequently to the 5th Battalion in 1965. A Service of Thanksgiving was held at St John's Church, Tisbury on the 23rd of May 2003.

PAINTER – Derrick Edward died on the 24th of March 2003. He served in the 1st Battalion in the late 1950's early 1960's in Hameln, Lydd, Greece, Gibraltar and Libya in B and Sp Companies. His funeral was held on the 11th of April 2003 at Weeley Crematorium. Alan Quartermaine represented the Regiment.

SHORE – Reginald Charles known as Taffy, 6201889 died on the 26th of November 2002 at the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital. He was aged 86. Reg joined the 2nd Battalion in November 1934 being posted to the 1st Battalion in December 1935 to join them in Egypt. He fought in the Battle for Hong Kong and whilst a Far East POW he was taken to Japan where he worked in Kami Kumi Camp Osaka. He arrived home from Japan in December 1945 and he left the Army in July 1946. He was a strong supporter of the Association and he remained in contact right up to the time of his death. His funeral was held at St Faith's Crematorium, Norwich during the morning of Friday the 6th of December 2002. Syd Hilton joined Reg's family and friends to represent the Regiment.

SMITH - Herbert J, 6203184, died on the 15th March 2003. His funeral was held at St Mary's Church, Harlow on Thursday the 27th of March 2003. Charlie Smith and Charlie Kennedy attended to represent the Regiment.

TOMLINSON – Thomas C L. Tommy or "Carrots" as he was more affectionately known passed away on December the 4th on his 84th birthday. He was semi invalid as a result of numerous heart attacks. A second World War veteran he enlisted into the 11th Bn Parachute Regiment TA on demob and subsequently transferred to the 8th Bn The Middlesex Regiment TA and then on the reorganisation of the TA into the 5th Bn The Middlesex Regiment. Carrots was a keen member of the Drums Platoon in all the Battalions in which he served. A member of the Hounslow Branch for many years his funeral was held at the Hanworth Crematorium and was attended by his many friends from the Hounslow Branch.

TORRIE - Alec 22259907 died on the 4th of February 2003 after a short illness. He was just short of his 68th birthday. Sgt Torrie served from 1950 until 1971 in the Band of the 1st Battalion and subsequently with the Queen's Regiment. He and his wife Jill moved to Portugal some years ago and his funeral took place there. At the end of April 2003 Jill moved back to the UK on a permanent basis.

VENISON – Eric, 14483704, died from the effects of a heart attack on the 16th of January 2003 aged 75. Eric who was always immaculately turned out, was the one time batman to Brigadier Tony Pielow. He served with the 1st Battalion from June 1945 to April 1948. His funeral was held on the 23rd of January 2003 at the Breakspeare Crematorium Ruislip. A very popular man with a great sense of humour. Over one hundred of his family and friends were at his funeral.

WARNER – Ronald 6210739, who was a Sgt with the 2/8th Battalion died recently aged 84. He was called up under the Militia Act in September 1939 and carried out his initial training with the 2/8th Battalion later to become the resuscitated 1st Battalion. We were together with the Regimental Police and after the London postings, the battalion went to Northern Ireland to the Portrush area where we stayed for two years. He was a very smart soldier subsequently serving with the provost attached to the CMP in France and Belgium during 1944/45. The funeral took place at Harlow Crematorium on Tuesday the 8th of April 2003. I represented the Regiment at the Service.

WILLIAMSON – Pat widow of Jim (Willie) Williamson died on Sunday the 16th of March 2003 at the Sutton Veney Nursing Home after fighting for some years against cancer. Pat served with her husband, a stalwart member of the QM's Platoon, with 1MX, 4 QUEEN'S, and then with 1 QUEEN'S until Willie retired from the Army at the end of his twenty-two year engagement. She was a great supporter of the Wives' Club and was particularly helpful to my wife, Betty Morris. She was always there when needed. She will be greatly missed. Her funeral was held at St Georges Church, Warminster on Wednesday the 26th of March 2003 and she was laid to rest alongside her husband in the Churchyard after the Service. Friends from the Regiment who joined the family to say goodbye were: Bob and Millie Jones, Alan Jones, Terry and Pat Price, Eddie Tackley, Danny Burgess and Derek Langston.

LIEUT COLONEL JOHN MORRIS HEWSON MC

John Hewson was born in London in 1932 and went to Mill Hill School. His father served in the Regiment and John was commissioned into it in October 1955, joining the 1st Battalion at Dhekellia Cyprus shortly afterwards. Whist serving in Cyprus he was awarded a particularly dashing MC when the patrol he was leading just before midnight on the 31st of July 1958 was ambushed by EOKA forces and he was wounded in the head by the terrorists opening burst of fire. Scarcely able to see through the blood pouring from his wound John ordered an immediate return of fire and then led a direct assault on the enemy, killing one of them and routing the others. A follow up action resulted in the arrest of several other terrorists. The "Hewson beret", with its badge bent by the enemy bullet and retaining a bit of John's hair, was an immediate regimental trophy, later going on display in the National Army Museum.

In 1959 John joined the Parachute Regiment and found time between jumps to marry Vanda in July 1961 at Holy Trinity, Brompton, and then served with 3 Para in the Middle East, before returning to the Home Counties Brigade in UK and being appointed Adjutant of 1MX in 1962 until May 1964.

His non-Regimental service included staff duty in Benghazi and when Defence Advisor in Ghana had the privilege of arresting the President, Flight Lieutenant Jerry Rawlings, whose rebel supporters had previously held John under arrest for a spell.

Before retiring in 1986, after a particularly varied and interesting military career, John had spent tours with the Military Secretary's Department, was Commanding Officer of the 6/7th Battalion of the Queen's Regiment (TA) and on the District Staff (Wales and Midlands) as a Recruiting and Liaison Staff Officer.

Retirement was a busy period for John. He joined the Game Conservancy which went a long way to satisfy his love for shooting and fishing, and found him at the Game Conservancy Stands at country shows all over the UK. From his home at Rockbourne he was a volunteer ambulance driver and ferried elderly people to their hospital appointments. His regimental service continued as a member, and also as Chairman of the Middlesex Regimental Association Committee and he was serving on this right up to the end.

In the Regiment he will be remembered by all of us as a fine Diehard and a particularly "Happy Warrior". Never without a smile and a friendly chat with everybody. A robust and charming character he fought his illness with bravery and the same cheerful optimistic way with which he approached everything else.

One can but admire somebody like John, and we all did. We were fortunate to have him in the Regiment.

CAPTAIN GUS KENRICK

Captain Gus Kenrick who died on the 17th of November 2002 aged 85, known throughout his service with the Regiment as Paddy Kenrick, was one of that distinguished band of warrant officers who, because of their personalities and war service, had such a profound influence of the Middlesex Regiment during the post war period.

Gus Kenrick was born in Fethard County Tipperary where he retired and where he was buried in the cemetery of the Augustinian Abbey Church. He was, perhaps, the last of many Irish soldiers who formed the backbone of the Regiment in days past and whose epitaph remains in the quick march of the 77th, "Paddy's Resource".

Gus joined the Middlesex Regiment at the beginning of the Second World War and fought with the 2nd Battalion from D Day to the capture of Bremen. After the war and the amalgamation of the Battalions he settled into Support Company of the 1st Battalion and, after a time as its Colour Sergeant became Company Sergeant Major for the Austria and Cyprus tours. Famous for its private armies and egregious personalities Support Company was notoriously difficult to control but Gus managed it with firmness and typical good humour.

In 1957 he was promoted and became Regimental Sergeant Major of the Depot at Mill Hill. A story from this period neatly illustrates his personality and sense of fun. A draft was departing for the 1st Battalion in Germany and Gus, accompanied by Jimmie Wild, went to see it off at Liverpool Street Station. Duty done and having refreshed themselves at "Dirty Dick's" they were making their way across a footbridge over the platforms when they saw the draft still scattered about below.

Observing this unmilitary spectacle Gus put his pace stick under his arm and with the cautionary word of command "Liverpool Street Station" gave the order "Attention". This apparent voice from the heavens caused some consternation below, where in those days most men were ex-service, and considerable dismay among the draft which had hoped to have heard the last of the Depot and its RSM.

Gus was commissioned in the Royal Corps of Signals in 1960 and served on detachment with the Royal West Africa Frontier Force. Eventually, after 33 years Army service he retired and took up a post in golf administration at St Andrew's where he remained until his final retirement at the age of sixty.

Gus was a much loved character in the Regiment and his reappearance at the Annual Reunion was greatly welcomed. We shall miss him.

CAPTAIN GEOFFREY KITCHENER

Captain Geoffrey Kitchener died of a heart attack on the 4th of February 2003 at his home near High Wycombe aged 73. Kit, as he was generally known, joined 1MX whilst they were on Public Duties at Chelsea Barracks, and subsequently served in Hong Kong and Korea, where he commanded 5 Platoon. Just before we left Korea, Kit returned to the UK to take RCB, which he passed, being granted a SSC, and was then temporarily attached to 1 E Surreys. Whilst with them in camp at Thetford his fellow subalterns deposited him in his sleeping bag in full view of the general public; unfortunately for Kit he was stark naked at the time.

Kit rejoined 1 MX and served in Austria until such time as he decided he would study Finnish at Coventry University. His course lasted the best part of three years at the end of which the War Office made full use of his newly acquired linguistic skills by posting him to the Staff in Singapore.

Kit returned to 1MX in Hamelin and it was there that his habit of lampooning senior officers on regimental guest nights somewhat à la Noel Coward became his downfall. It was a "gift" that he had developed in Austria and was highly amusing to the majority of his audience. However certain people were not at all amused and this in the end contributed to his short service commission not being extended.

On leaving the Army Kit worked first for Hallmark Cards and then gravitated towards the media – Pathè Pictorial, IPC and EMI in personnel and associated management. He settled in Walters Ash, also the home of HQ Strike Command. He had a very kind nature, particularly where the young or disadvantaged were concerned (he hated it when he had to tell employees of IPC that they were redundant). He also had a mischievous sense of fun which happily he only exercised on those he knew well. Many were the unsuspecting members of the general public who were horrorstruck by his antics!

Whilst his seniors may not have appreciated Kit's sense of humour his peers certainly

RENDSBURG REVISTED

On April 10th 2003 in the company of Diehards Jack Jones, Richard Child, and his wife Waltraut, I was once again heading for Rendsburg in Northern Germany. This time it was to attend the opening of an exhibition at the Rendsburg Museum entitled Stunde Null (Zero hour). This exhibition depicted the end of the war and the commencement

of a new beginning for Germany in 1945. Among the many interesting artefacts were several examples of German ingenuity during those very hard days. A German helmet converted to a cooking pot, a jerrycan converted to a bucket, a homemade hand cart. Also very prominent was a section devoted to the occupation forces in which the 1st Battalion figured to no small degree. This was thanks to the hard work and diligence of Heinz "Jimmy" Johannsen. This is where we three came in to join the other old military relics of those days (a live version!).

As far as we were involved, the exhibition was spread over two days. The first on Friday the 11th was devoted to a Press and TV coverage and we were all photographed a great deal and gave brief interviews. Subsequently articles, together with our photographs as we were in 1946, and now, were published in several German newspapers. The exhibition opened to the public on the 12th of April and is due to stay open until the end of June.

The opening address was made by the Burgermeister Andreas Breitner. He was then followed by Heinz Johannsen who captivated the audience with his eloquence both in English and German. He read out Brigadier Tony Pielow's letter of apology for his non attendance and then he went on to read a passage from the memoirs of Captain C C Bilnet, MTO of the 1st Battalion which he had translated into German. I now quote the

passage: "It would be naïve to say we were not apprehensive about the future. Training was one thing but this was real war with all that went with it. During this first journey we

saw what was to become a common sight, numerous graves at the side of the road, together with shattered buildings, burnt out vehicles and dead animals in the fields. War is war. There is no nice war it is all very nasty."

The Curator of the Museum Dr Martin Westphal then made a speech. He thanked us for coming to Germany to attend and he went on to emphasise the importance of those days fifty seven years ago. I then made a short speech and presented to the Burgermeister a Regimental Plaque from the Association to the people of Rendsburg. It will be displayed in the Rendsburg Town Hall.. That concluded the opening ceremonies and from there on we mingled with those attending. We had many interesting chats about those far off days. One that amazed me was that during a brief smoke break in a passage Dick Child and I were approached by a local councillor who spoke very good English who thanked us for liberating Germany in 1945.

Now a word about a very staunch Diehard, Heinz Johannsen. As a lot of you will know he came to England shortly before Christmas 2002 to visit as many of his friends as he could manage and as well as Christmas gifts he left us with the sad news that he was shortly to undergo an operation for prostrate cancer. Well I am happy to tell you that, so far, the operation has been a success and Heinz was looking well and healthy. He met us in Lubeck at 1145pm and drove us back to our hotel in Fockbeg arriving there at about 1.30am, went to the hospital for treatment at 8 am, then back to the hotel to pick us up and then to the Museum followed by a quick tour of Eider Kaserne, our old barracks. Here I took a photograph of Heinz outside the old cookhouse where he stood, all those years ago, with his bucket to collect our leavings to support his family through the hard winter of 1945/46. During our four days in Rendsburg the pattern was the same. Treatment at the hospital for Heinz at 8am. Then home for a brief rest and then back to take us to places of interest. On our last day Heinz drove us to Hamburg to visit the British Military Cemetery. There we found the grave of Sqt Len Hiscock of B Company whom I knew for many years. We then went to Lubeck and lingered in Lessingstrasse where we were billeted in 1945. Heinz found a German gentleman who had lived in the house opposite. He told a story of being on leave, having been wounded on the Russian front, and trying to surrender. Dressed in his best uniform he went to the Battalion HQ who eventually handed him over to the Town Major who sent him home, and not to the POW cage, so that he could carry on being treated at the local hospital. Then off to the Airport to catch our plane home.

In conclusion we, Jack, Richard, Waltraut and myself would like to thank Heinz and his ever charming wife Ilse for their hospitality and many kindnesses during our stay in Rendsburg.

1. Opening Remarks.

1.1. The Chairman opened the Meeting at 1415 hours and he made a special point of welcoming Brig Tony Pielow, our President and Maj Bradley from the RHQ PWRR to the last Meeting of the Executive Committee in its current form.

2. Minutes of the last Meeting.

2.1. It was agreed that the Minutes of the Meetings held on the 4 of March 2002 and the 22nd of January 2003 were a true record. Proposed by Col Cain and seconded by Mr Ward. Carried.

3. Matters arising.

3.1. There was one matter arising from paragraph 6.7 of the meeting held on the 4th of March. Capt Doran said that we had approval in principle from the Charity Commission to move our funds to the PWRR but there are two funds, the Officers' Central Militia Fund and the 4th Bn Officers' Mess Fund that the Charity Commission consider are permanently endowed. However there is a procedure to get round this by passing a resolution for the expenditure of capital under Section 75 of the Charities Act 1993.

The appropriate documents were circulated for the Trustees present to sign and the required notices to be displayed at Enfield and Hounslow passed to Messrs Burford and Ward. There is a requirement to produce final accounts for both the Association and the Militia Funds showing a nil balance once the funds have been transferred to the PWRR. Once these final accounts have been received by the Charity Commission the Middlesex Charities will be removed from the register and cease to exist.

4. Secretary's Report.

- 4.1. The Secretary presented his report that had been previously circulated.
- 4.2. The following grants were approved for 2003:

Royal Star & Garter Home £250 MX & NW London ACF £950

5. Finance Committee Chairman's Report.

- 5.1. Brig Marciandi presented the accounts that had been previously circulated. He said that this was his 9th and final report. Although the stock market had dropped drastically in recent months most of our losses were paper losses only when you compare that in 1993 our total worth (including the Officers' Club) was £347,000, the year 2000 £725,000 and today £600,000. The Broker had to dispose of some investments to avoid further losses but at the same time we did make some profit from sales. The stock market will rise but it may take a long time. The Brigadier then expressed his thanks for the support given to him by the Finance Committee.
- 5.2. Brig Marciandi then asked the Committee to approve the accounts for the year ending the 31st of December 2002. Proposed by Col Cain and seconded by Mr Burford that they be approved. Carried.
- 5.3. The Chairman then expressed the thanks of the Executive to Brig Marciandi and the Finance Sub Committee for their hard work over the years since the Sub Committee was reformed.
- 5.4. The Secretary mentioned that the PWRR had decided to retain the services of our Broker, Brewin Dolphin, when they take over the accounts.

6. The Museum Fund - Final Disposal.

6.1. It was agreed that the cash held on deposit with Brewin Dolphin for the Museum Fund, some £6K, be handed over with the other funds to the PWRR for the maintenance of the Middlesex artefacts within the Museum at Dover.

7. Branch Funding.

7.1. It was agreed that the following amounts be made available to the branches:

2/7th Bn OCA	£300	a grant to assist with the cost of their annual reunion and luncheon to be held on 2nd October.
Korean Club	£300	a grant to assist with the cost of their annual reunion and luncheon to be held on the 13th of September.
Enfield Branch	£150	to help defray the costs connected to the dedication service and parade for their new standard.

7.2. Brig Marciandi said that these grants should not set a precedent particularly as the funding was moving to the PWRR. Maj Bradley said each application for future funding would be carefully considered and if necessary advice would be sought from the new smaller Executive Committee.

8. Functions for 2003.

- 8.1. It was noted that the following functions have been arranged for 2003:-
- 10th May The Albuhera Service of Remembrance at St Paul's Cathedral at 3pm followed by the AGM and the Reunion at the Victory Services Club in the evening.
- 16th May Annual Albuhera Luncheon at the National Army Museum. This year we are the hosts. The presentation will be "The National Serviceman".
- 8th November Annual Service of Remembrance at the Middlesex Guildhall.
- 8.2. The Committee approved the following grants to meet the cost of the above functions:-

Annual Service	up to £2750
AGM & Reunion	up to £2750 (tickets this year to be priced at £10)

Service at the Middlesex Guildhall - up to £300.

9. The Colours in the Regimental Chapel.

9.1. Several suggestions were made with regard to the final disposal of the four colours from the 57th and 77th of Foot that are too fragile to go back on display. One was to purchase a small casket and bury the remains in a suitable location, perhaps on the Field at Albuhera. Another was to approach the National Army Museum to see if they would be interested in having them. The Secretary was instructed to make the appropriate enquiries.

10. Consideration of the new Rules.

- 10.1. Capt Doran reminded the meeting that the proposed new rules were circulated at our last meeting held on the 22nd of January 2003. Members were asked to notify Capt Doran directly if they considered they should be altered in any way. Col Cain and Mr Burford thought that there should not be a provision for Associate members. This was agreed and the new rules reflect this.
- 10.2. There are now 28 rules as opposed to 50. They are required to be placed before the AGM on the 10th of May where hopefully they will be approved. They do not take effect until then. The Secretary said he would produce the copies for the AGM and he would also send copies to the branches so that they can be studied prior to that meeting
- 10.3. Col Cain proposed that subject to approval at the AGM the new rules be adopted. This was seconded by Mr Young. Carried.

11. Reconstitution of the Executive Committee.

11.1. The President reminded the meeting that the new rules just considered provided for, when approved, a slimmed down Committee of seven members. As President he has the duty to nominate the new members but before doing so he wished to thank all those who have worked for the Regiment for so long, over many years, not only those here today but many others as well. He then welcomed Maj Bradley from the PWRR and said subject to those nominated accepting the new Committee would be: Maj Lawrence as Chairman, members Col Cain, Majs Bradley, Henshaw and Morris, Capt Doran and Mr Ward. He hoped that those members of the existing Committee not nominated might, at some future date, if requested, be prepared to come back to serve. The President indicated his nominations were provisional in advance of the new rules being adopted.

12. Staff Redundancies.

12.1. Brig Marciandi said that when Maj Waldron retired he was granted a pension. Both Maj Morris and Mrs Morris have given splendid service to the Association and it was appropriate that this service be recognised. He recommended that both should be awarded a redundancy payment of £5K to be paid by £4.5K from each account plus £1K from the Officers' Club. To be paid before the funds move across to the PWRR. This was then formally proposed by Capt Enthoven and seconded by Mr Phillips. Carried.

13. Any other business.

13.1. Under this heading the President raised the appointment of our representative on the PWRR Trustee Board. Brig Bulloch had volunteered to take this on at the meeting held on the 4th of March 2002. However the President has decided, in accordance with his powers outlined in the existing rules, not to ratify this decision. He thought it

appropriate, during the early stages of our new relationship with the PWRR, that he should assume this appointment. This was fully accepted by the members of the Committee present. The Chairman would to write to Brig Bulloch to inform him of this decision.

- 13.2. The Secretary asked for guidance on the form of the next meeting to be held at the Army and Navy Club on the 1st of April 2003. It was decided that there was no requirement for an agenda, a formal meeting is not necessary. Members should meet at 1200 hours for a drink followed by lunch at 1300 hours. Secretary said he would send out a map for those who were not familiar with the Club's location and he would advise the Club of our changed requirements.
- 13.3. Col Cain said he has a contact who is well informed about the future of our old Depot. There is a proposal to preserve the Officers' Mess as a Country Club. If this occurs the Memorial is likely to stay in situ. The rest of the barracks is likely to become a housing estate. Mr Ward said that if the Memorial is to be moved he thought there is a good chance that it could go to St Paul's Church in Hounslow. There is plenty of room at the Church. He will sound out the Vicar.
- 13.4. Mr Ward asked if he could have a grant of £150 to help him finance a new printer. His present one is US. He will require a printer for Association business when he takes over the publishing of the newsletter. This was agreed.
- 13.5. Mr Burford asked members to note that as the 16th of May falls on a weekend in 2004 the Enfield Branch will hold a function to celebrate the day and they would welcome support.
- 13.6. Capt Doran asked that in recognition of services given to the Association over the years that Maj Morris and the Rev Tuft be made Honorary members. This proposal was seconded by Mr Burford. Carried.

14. Closing Remarks.

14.1. The Chairman thanked everyone for attending the final meeting of the Committee as it now exists and he looked forward to seeing them all on the 1st of April.

1. Opening remarks.

1.1. The Chairman welcomed Major D Bradley to this his first meeting. Major Bradley is to be the point of contact at the RHQ PWRR for all Association matters as from the 1st of June 2003.

2. Minutes of the Previous Meeting.

- 2.1. The Minutes of the last Meeting held on the 11th of May 2002 were agreed as a true record. Proposed by Mr M J Mulvaney and seconded by Mr M M A W Smith. Carried.
